AREA BOARD GRANTS

Area Boards now have a more streamlined funding criteria, and I want to ensure that future applicants are aware of the new system. Changes include:

- Town and Parish Councils no longer eligible to apply to Community Area Grant Scheme (capital funding for projects for people of any age) but are still eligible to apply to Health and Wellbeing Funding and Local Youth Network Funding
- Hard and fast rule that applications MUST be submitted 4 weeks before the area board meeting at which they will be considered – if the application is submitted 3 weeks and 6 days before the meeting they will not be considered and will have to wait until the following meeting
- Match funding requirement has changed – used to be that any application where the total project cost was > £1,000 required 50% match funding, but this requirement is now in place for any application where the total project cost is > £500

THE EDINGTON FESTIVAL IS BACK!

After two decidedly different and unusual festivals due to Covid and Covid restrictions, the Edington Music Festival returns on Sunday August 21st for its official 65th outing.

The festival will run for its usual eight days – Sunday 21st to Sunday 28th August, with four services a day, three choirs of top-flight singers under three of the country's leading choral directors, all under the direction of a new Festival Director, Robert Quinney, Director of the Choir at New College Oxford (and former Festival Organist and Director of the Nave Choir.)

Robert has themed the music for this special festival under the heading "Creation and Recreation", a nod both to its re-emergence and to its capacity for promoting relaxation and fulfilment.

The week will follow the traditional form starting each day with Matins (plainchant), followed by Eucharist, then Evensong and ending with Compline by candlelight, also plainchant. Wednesday 24th will be both the return of the BBC recording, (to be broadcast at a later date), and the Festival Supper in the evening; the Friday evening service will be a Requiem Mass (by Michael Haydn, younger brother of Joseph), and the week will also include Vaughan Williams' 'Mass in G Minor', Copland's 'In the beginning', and Dove's 'Seek him that maketh the Seven Stars'.

Small birds of prey in Edington

One of the joys of walking around Edington is coming round a corner and encountering a kestrel hovering over the roadside or field. The kestrel is Britain's commonest bird of prey, and we are so lucky to have it around sharing Edington with us.

Kestrels typically hunt by flying along until prey or a likely spot for prey is sighted. They then check and hover, with fluttering wings and tail fanned out and pointing down for stability. In spite of the exertion of hovering, the kestrel can keep its head motionless to pinpoint possible prey usually small mammals such as voles or mice. Lift-like, the bird drops by stages, finally

pouncing and grasping with its talons the unfortunate animal. Because of their hunting style, Kestrels require open areas to hunt over, such as farmland, marshes, moors, heaths, coastlines, city centres, and roadside verges.

The kestrel usually uses an old nest in a tree of another species to breed. It tends to favour the abandoned nests of crows, magpies, pigeons, and various other birds of prey. It usually chooses a nest as high as possible selecting old nests more than 12 metres above the ground. It occasionally also nests on bare ledges or in holes and has also taken to nest on high towers, ruins, or tall buildings. On rocks, it nests in fissures or holes or on jutting ledges.

The female usually lays four or five yellowish-white eggs strikingly marked with reddish-brown spots. The female usually incubates the eggs while the male hunts and fetches her food. The incubation period is from 27 to 30 days. The chicks take anything from 27 to 39 days to fledge.

Our other small raptor around Edington, the sparrowhawk, has a completely different way of hunting its prey. The sparrowhawk is more of an ambush predator. Prey is caught by surprise attack either from a concealed perch or flight close to a hedgerow or woodland edge. After killing, the prey is taken to a stump or log to be plucked and then eaten. The sparrowhawk has long legs and a long central toe – for catching and holding prey – indicating that it is a bird eater. Small birds are usually caught on the wing in swift dashes.

The sparrowhawk is more of a woodland dweller and spends most of its time perched in thick cover. The short, rounded wings and long tail are adaptations for flying between trunks and branches. This gives them great nimble manoeuvrability between the trees. They tend to be solitary, and their flight is strong and powerful. At times they can be seen soaring or gliding over the trees in search of prey. Open flight is usually a brief series of rapid wingbeats





interspersed with long or short glides. If prey is observed, you may be treated to an aerial dive onto the unfortunate victim.

Besides forest and mixed woodlands, sparrowhawks are also found on farmland with hedgerows, and heaths.

The sparrowhawk is one of the smallest birds of prey in Britain, the male being only slightly bigger than a blackbird. The female is much larger than the male and double its weight. She is also duller with pale eyebrows and barred grey below and has a yellow eye (that of the male is orange).

The sparrowhawk prefers to nest in regions where small woods alternate with open country. The nest, which is made of sticks, is built close to the trunk of a tree. It is rather flattish, often a bulky platform of sticks, and it usually built mainly by the female. A new nest often takes about 15 days to build but renovating an old nest takes a much shorter time. They have been known to use an old crow's or pigeon's nest for a foundation. The female lays four to six oval, bluish-white eggs with spots, blotches of dark or chocolate-brown. The female incubates the eggs for about 42 days and the chicks take about 32 days to fledge.

Until the chicks are old enough to be left alone, the male sparrowhawk does all the hunting, feeding both the young and the female. Then both parents hunt for the juveniles, and they continue to do so up to a month after the young sparrowhawks have left the nest.

Morris dancers in the village.

On a wet cold May day White Horse Morris arrived at the Three Daggers. greeted by some hardy locals, that had braved the weather. A break in the rain and dancing commenced with the clashing of sticks and flashing of hankies to the beat of melodeons. Even some of the locals had a go until the cold and rain drove everybody inside for a well earned pint.



White horse is a mixed side that dance a mixture of Cotswold and border. They started in 1951 in Westbury and were all male until about 10 years ago . Today they practice in Wylie during the winter and dance out at events and pubs during the summer.



Cotswold is the style of dancing most associated with morris dancing. Traditionally danced in white with bells and baldricks. The dances were largely collected from Cotswold villages where the tradition never died out and can be traced back for centuries.

Border Morris comes from the welsh borders and is usually more energetic danced in rags rather than whites. Men traditionally blacked their faces with coal to disguise themselves and some sides style of dance has a threatening feel to it.
